After the prize giving ceremony there will be an illustrated talk by **Philippa O'Brien on gardening for bees and wildlife.**

We would like to see more of the Hampstead Horticultural Society members supporting their club. Our Fairs, Shows and Garden Plant Sales are how we build up our funds to pay for the venues we use, and I regret to say that over the last two years numbers have fallen.

Hampstead Horticultural Society is a wonderful opportunity for everyone interested in plants, and floral displays be it in window boxes, balconies, gardens or vase.

There are opportunities to join in activities such as long week-ends and day coach trips. Meetup your Expectations

MEMBERS who use email should join the Meetup website, if they have not already done so, the Chairman Ken Ellis told the newsletter.

Meetup makes a useful companion to the main website, the Hampstead Horticultural Society, provided by Yola.com, Ken Ellis said. A Member on email who joins Meetup would benefit from the fast communication with all other Members who have joined the mass communication website. It encourages people as a first step to join us, even if they have not had any contact with the Society or come to an event. Existing Society Members of course could also join Meetup. Meetup can automatically sends messages to all Members at once, including reminders of events just before they take place.

Ken's instructions to join Meetup:-

1. **Search online for Meetup.com**
2. **Click on the Find button**
3. **Immediately below the heading 'Kinds of Meetups' type in the tiny search box 'Hampstead Horticultural'. On your keyboard press the Enter key. Click on our photograph or heading.**
4. **On our Hampstead Horticultural Society screen that appears click the 'Join Us' button at the top right of the screen.**
5. **Put your details in the boxes that appear. For privacy's sake, use only your first name and provide only the information that you wish to. You will note that many members have not answered most of the questions about their gardening preferences and so on.**
6. **Please note that the method of joining will vary according to what appears on your individual screen. Procedure seems to differ from time to time and from search to search.**
7. **If to find us on Meetup you need to provide more than the name of our Society, you will probably be required to type in the location. In that case, add 'London NW3'.**
8. **There is a tiny Help button on the top right corner of the screen.**

SUBJECT TO WEATHER CONDITIONS

Who went to the RHS Spring Show at Vincent Square, Victoria London SW1 in March 2012

I arrived at the RHS building Lindley Hall early afternoon, and not being a regular visitor offered to pay by debit card. Horror of horror I was directed to find a hole in the wall, **only cash accepted**. I returned 45 minutes later and bought my ticket at the Lawrence Hall behind the Vincent Hall building. **Lesson learnt.**

On entering there was a display of rock plants, alpines planted in all sorts of containers little and large. The old sinks, large broken flower pot, boots, very nice but not very bright. To my left along the wall camellias, a magnificent display of reds pinks whites, tiny clusters of nearly white florets. I asked is this the tea plant - no it was not, but very similar. Next I turned right towards bright spring colours of yellow daffodils of all sizes, early miniature Tete a Tete hardy enough to take over the woodland area. And narcissi, with double and triple petals, the trumpet lost. Can someone tell me is it the trumpet or the petals that are trebled? There were stands with pink cyclamen, snow drops tiny ones and longer stems with many pearl drops hanging off.

To the front of the hall the Hellebores with the darkest reds and bright yellow and green, all the shades of pink. The yellow is a must have. For me the hellebores took centre stage, one of my favourite spring flowers.

There was a steady flow of over sixties, not surprising being a Wednesday, just the occasional youngster, quite the opposite in the design section in the Vincent Hall side.

Over the antenna came an invite to hear a talk by Lady Christine Skemerdale from Somerset on the

Shaded Woodland Garden, planting for Autumn to Spring, just right for me I have a small shaded garden with a large silver birch. The talk was on her newly acquired garden with deciduous woodland area needing attention; she skimmed and cleared the area, composted the leaves, laid compost under the trees to give the plants a head start. She had a table covered with a black plastic sheet and as she described the plants suitable she placed them on the table. She explained her joy to see the spring flowers coming out of hibernation.

First were Snowdrops, Aconites, Autumn Cyclamen, wild primroses which will seed themselves and white primrose from Greece, little clustered flowers that keep flowering to May, these need dividing in December. Hellebores which I learnt originate from Turkey, H. Orientale's, CyCoo from Vigor, Balkan species which is used in hybridizing for colour, Celandine red, and Brazen Hussie. Not to forget Wild Anemones, and blue Hantire very small flower, throw broadcast then compost over. Crocus which will seed, Dwarf Iris Reticulata from Iran & Turkey and the most delicate Cila Mischenko ana wella ana like a miniature white hyacinth.

Christine recommends when flowering has finished cover over with wood chippings until September when Autumn Cyclamen Headra Folium will appear.

Now you will say next spring do we remove the leaves & wood chipping OR! Me - I'd leave well alone? What about you? Mary B.
