### Annual General Meeting

The Income and Expenditure accounts for the year ended December 2011 were presented and approved at the AGM and are reprinted in this Newsletter.

### **To complete the AGM we had a talk on Fuchsia's by Ken Nutt from Enfield Fuchsia Society (attached to Capel Manor Horticultural School where they meet)**

Ken started his talk by letting us know that we may ask questions no matter how stupid through out his talk. He included slides demonstrating each aspect of growing Fuchsia plants. And slides of his demonstration and how beautiful and colorful his garden borders are in summer.

These plants start life as small cuttings, those tender small growths we see four leaves, pinch off, place in compost removing the two largest leaves carefully, this is where the new roots start. No rooting hormone necessary.

Ken fed his plants weekly from your regular plant mix diluted again 1/8 & requiring more nitrogen for growth.

Ken had his own compost mix Shamrock peat, Levington mix which contains plant food, Horticultural grit (potting) & vermiculite. He did say any compost you like would do the trick.

The plants start in very small pots and as they become root bound a slightly bigger pot, surprisingly his large full grown Fuchsia were only in 5 & 6 inch pots.

As the plant grows with side stems which he allowed for two growths and then pinched the end to promote bushiness and again the main stem he pinched at the top six or so inches high. Depending what height you want.

Then on his slides Ken showed us how you can grow standards, spirals, bonsai and many other shapes which if you wish to grow, joining his society might be the answer. Membership is small 65 but slides of members showing at their Fuchsia Show, 30 classes, tables all filled just goes to show just how keen Fuchsia growers are.

Fuchsia come from South Americas' and are mostly warm, growing some grow like trees, one yellow tiny low growing came from New Zealand. They need protection in winter and no watering. And now dealing with the bugs he uses Provardo which also kills the vine weevil. Botrytis is another problem, plenty of air if the plants are in a humid place. There was plenty more said including names of varieties.

### **BEST ALL ROUND MANURES FOR ALLOTMENTS AND GARDENS**

#### **Horse manure (best at winter)**

Allowing time for breakdown and worm interaction

**How much;** how much can you get hold of for your fallow section? LOVELY

Remember to throw some with your home made composting.

#### **Blood Fish & Bone( best all rounder) ( through out year)**

If one only uses BFB then scatter evenly and dig in before planting, helps to water well, so on an allotment scatter evenly on a rainy day.

**How much;** so as you can see a fine layer, I wear a scarf or mask this powder is for the plants not are lungs. And as you will be using again and again don't need to go mad.

My personal belief is that I want my plants to grow deep so water well, this helps make them more sturdy therefore I like to help the BFB penetrate below the soil, unless scattering in the winter.

#### **Chicken Pellets ( when Planting)**

Some people swear by chicken pellets and a scattering when planting can only be good giving the plants plenty of choices, the plant will use the chemical that they grow best on.

**NPK** we all see this on packets & bottles the above has plenty of nitrogen/potassium/phosphates including all the other extras iron, zinc, magnesium etc.

Each one of us will find our own favorite manure for our garden, be experimental, the above is to get you started and producing wonderful crops of vegetables and blooming flowers.

For those of us that use **Tomato grow liquid manures**, continue for these hungry plants and soft fruit especially when in pots and grow bags, read the instructions carefully.

The above have been written about and tested in garden magazines and Allotment books, other fertilizers were included in tests and the above are the best results and have worked well for me.

- Class 1 **Narcissi(daffodils) large trumpet** (Lyndhurst Cup) *up to 5 cut long trumpet narcissi, any variety can be mixed. (Trumpet as long as, or longer than, perianth)*
- Class 2 **Narcissi (daffodils) excluding large trumpet** (Bertram Cup) *up to 5 cut narcissi, any variety, can be mixed.*
- Class 3 **Tulips**, (£3 prize) *5 cut tulips, can be all one variety, or mixed varieties*
- Class 4 **Small bulbous flowers** (£3 prize) *3 cut flowers of any one variety*
- Class 5 **Flowering bulbs** (£3 prize) *a bowl or pot of flowering bulbs)*
- Class 6 **Hellebores** (£3 prize) *3 stems, any variety, can be mixed)*
- Class 7 **Pot plant(s) flowering** (Society Trophy)
- Class 8 **Pot plant(s) foliage** (Diploma in Horticulture)
- Class 9 **Pot plant(s) succulent or cactus** (£3 prize)
- Class 10 **Pot plant(s) grown indoors from seed or cutting** (£3 prize)
- Class 11 **Outdoor cut flowers from the exhibitor's garden** (£3 prize) *Up to 6 stems, each of a different variety, in a plain glass jar (e.g. a jam jar) Names on a card.*
- Class 12 **Outdoor cut shrubs or trees in flower** (Arnold Trophy) *Up to 6 stems, each of a different variety, in a plain glass jar (e.g. a jam jar). Names on a card.*
- Class 13 **Flowering shrub from the exhibitor's garden** (£3 prize) *1 stem, could be a single flower.*
- Class 14 **Camellia** (Horwood Bowl) *1 flower with leaves, no buds*
- Class 15 **"My garden in spring"** (£3 prize) *A basket or trug of spring gleanings from your garden. The diversity and quality of plant material is of most importance. Material may be placed on moss or have ends wrapped to conserve moisture. Oasis and jars of water are not permitted.*

**Floral art classes \*\*\*\*\***

Alcoves will be provided for classes 17, 18 and 19. These arrangements should be in proportion to the alcoves, which are 76cm (2' 6") high. Bases are allowed in all classes unless otherwise stated.

NAFAS rules state that the following will lead to disqualification:

- 1) Failure to comply with any specific requirements for a class as stated in the show schedule, i.e. the measurements or components
- 2) Inclusion of any fresh plant material that does not have its roots or the cut ends of its stems in water or water retaining material. Air plants, cacti, fruits, grass turf, lichen, moss, succulents and vegetables need not conform to this ruling.
- 3) Inclusion of artificial plant material (unless specifically allowed by a show schedule).

- Class 16 **A miniature flower arrangement** (Ackworth Bowl) *Not more than 10cm (4") in any dimension.*
- Class 17 **A petite arrangement** (Brearley cup) *Not more than 23cm (9") in any dimension.*
- Class 18 **A modern arrangement (freestyle) arrangement** (Ena cup) Height and width In proportion to alcove (see above)
- Class 19 **'April Showers' An interpretive arrangement** (£3 Prize) Size in proportion to alcove (see above)  
*Accessories allowed.*
- Class 20a **Children's class: A painting or collage of a flower** (£3 prize) 6 – 12 years
- Class 20b **Children's Class: A painting or collage of a flower** (£3 prize) 5 or under

**Photographic classes \*\*\*\*\***

- Class 27 **Light & shade (in a garden, a park, landscape etc)**
- Class 28 **A garden disaster!**

Size of photographs to be between Postcard and up to but no greater than A4. **Photos to be submitted no later than Wednesday 12<sup>th</sup> April to Show Secretary**

- Class 21 **Marmalade, Seville orange\*** (Rosette) *1 jar*
- Class 22 **Marmalade\*, any other variety** (Rosette) *1 jar*
- Class 23 **4 fruit scones** (Rosette)
- Class 24 **Carrot cake\*** (recipe) (Rosette)

Class 25 **A nut roast (Rosette)**

Class 26a **Children's class – an edible flower (£3 prize) 6 – 12 years**

Class 26b **Children's class – an edible flower (£3 prize) 5 or under**

\*Jars should be clean and labelled with date and variety. Size 340 – 475g with jam pot cover, no screw tops.

### **\*Carrot cake recipe**

Tin needed – round, deep 20cm (8 in) if possible. Oven temp; 180°C/350°/Gas mark 4

225g (8oz) self-raising flour	100g (4oz) carrots, coarsely grated
2 teaspoons baking powder	2 ripe bananas, mashed
150g (5oz) light muscovado sugar	2 eggs
50g (2oz) walnut pieces, chopped	100ml sunflower oil

Lightly grease the cake tin and line the base with a circle of non-stick baking parchment. Pre-heat the oven to temperature as above. Put all the ingredients for the cake into a large bowl and mix until thoroughly blended, using an electric mixer or a wooden spoon as preferred. Turn the mixture into the prepared cake tin and gently level the surface. Bake for 50 – 60 minutes, until the cake is well risen, golden and beginning to shrink away from the side of the tin. A fine skewer inserted into the centre of the cake should come out clean. Allow the cake to cool in the tin for a few minutes, then loosen the side of the cake from the tin, turn it out onto a wire rack and leave to cool completely.

### **Topping**

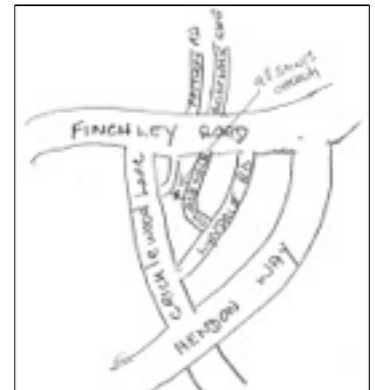
When cool, ice with orange flavoured water icing decorated with chopped walnuts and/or grated orange peel.

### **Rules for the Spring Show**

1. All classes are open to members and residents of Camden and neighbouring districts.
2. In any class, only one entry per person
3. Entry fees – members 20p, non-members 25p per exhibit
4. Entry forms must be with the Show Secretary by 12th April 2012. Late entries will be accepted at the Show Secretary's discretion and only if space is still available.
5. All exhibits in classes 1 to 6 and 10 to 15 must have been grown by the exhibitor. Exhibits in Classes 7 to 10 must have been in the exhibitor's possession for at least 3 months. Entries for classes 16 to 26 must have been made by the exhibitor.
6. Exhibits in Classes 7 to 10 and 27 -28 must not have been shown before at any HHS Show.
7. Exhibitors to supply their own containers, dishes, plates etc.
8. All exhibits to be staged between 9.30 a.m. and 11.30 a.m. on the day of the show. At noon the hall will be cleared for judging to begin.
9. An exhibitor who has won first prize in any of classes 1 to 15 for three years in succession is eligible only for "Highly Commended" if his/her exhibit comes first in that class in the following year.
10. Any award or prize may be withheld or modified at the discretion of the judges if the exhibits in particular classes are considered unworthy of the award or prize offered.
11. On the relative merits of the exhibits the decision of the judges will be final.
12. All other matters are the responsibility of the Show Secretary.
13. The Society cannot accept responsibility for loss or damage, but reasonable care will be taken.
